## TEACHING AND ADVISING EXPERIENCE

  - This Master’s level course examines the politics of regulating Big Tech with a focus on approaches pursued in the European Union and United States. Substantive topics include consumer protection, labor rights, antitrust, the sharing economy, and social media.
  - Evaluation: 1.0/5.0 (“1” is best) (Summer Semester 2021); 1.3/5.0 (Winter Semester 2021-2022).
